In Memory of a Special Volunteer

Dr. Allen Trelease came to Greensboro in 1967 after teaching history and heading the history and government department, as well as serving briefly as acting dean of faculty at Wells College in Aurora, N.Y. Allen taught at UNCG for 27 years before retiring in 1994 as a professor emeritus in history at the University. He authored several books including topics such as Indian affairs, the Civil War's reconstruction period, the Ku Klux Klan, the NC railroad system and the history of The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, receiving awards for his publications. He served as head of the Department of History for two terms at UNCG and as a past president of the Historical Society of North Carolina.

During Shepherd's Center's 24 year history, Allen benefited our older adult community in many ways. He served on our Board of Trustees, volunteered with Adventures in Learning (AIL) and drove for the Shepherd's Wheels Program.

I suppose he was most at-home when volunteering with AIL due to his extensive university experience. As Coordinator of the Fall 2011 Planning Committee, Allen had just completed the many tasks he had assigned himself. As an instructor, he often needed the largest classroom space to accommodate the numerous students interested in his popular topics and interactive teaching style. He also provided assistance during each AIL session. He was meticulous and capable, entertaining and engaging. Whether it was introducing midday speakers, ringing the bell that launched and ended each class, deciding which table could go first in line for lunch or simply letting the forum speaker know "Time is Up", Allen was always willing to help.

In the short time I had the pleasure of working with Allen, I noted he was always willing to help and share his knowledge. His dedication and commitment to helping others as well as his dependability and quick wit will be sorely missed by all of us at Shepherd's Center.

ShepNet Computer Classes

Computer classes (using a Windows operating system) for persons age 50+ are taught by Shepherd's Center peer volunteers. They are offered monthly in the ShepNet Computer Center for Seniors provided by Friends Homes at 925A New Garden Road.



Classes meet twice weekly (Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday) in the morning (9:00 – 11:30) or afternoon (1:30 – 4:00); some related activities are scheduled on Friday mornings but not on weekends or evenings. Course fees are \$35 for 6-8 session classes; \$15 for short courses. This form is to add your name to a waitlist.

If you want to take a course within the next three months, complete the waitlist form below selecting no more than three topics. Note if you have time limitations (e.g., no mornings or MW only). Do not send any money until you are enrolled. Your name will be added to a waitlist. You will be contacted by phone when we reach your name. Mouse and keyboard usage – course optional but these skills are required for all other classes.

DEVELOPING YOUR COMPUTER SKILLS – 6 sessions Version: __Win7/Vista

Computer applications including word processing, basic file management, simple internet, email.

DATABASES and SPREADSHEETS – 4 sessions

A brief introduction to two popular computer software programs after completing the above course.

INTERNET AND E-MAIL MANAGEMENT – 6 sessions

In-depth exploration of internet browsing and email options with emphasis on security. Requires proficiency in appropriate Developing Your Skills course as well as Internet access.

WORD PROCESSING – 8 sessions

Prepare correspondence, documents, and other text materials with Word 2007. Requires mastery of computer skills and expectation to practice between class sessions.

MANAGING YOUR COMPUTER SYSTEM – 7 sessions Version: __Win7/Vista

Become more proficient in using your operating system. Manage your desktop, files and folders, menus and settings. This course is a prerequisite for the following two courses.

PICASA PHOTO EDITING – 3 sessions

Learn the basics with a free software program. Managing Your Computer System is prerequisite.

PHOTO EDITING with PHOTOSHOP ELEMENTS – 8 sessions

Use a complete editing program to improve, restore, enhance, and manipulate images. Requires previous completion of Managing Your Computer System and the Picasa short course.

Shepherd's Center of Greensboro has partnered with the Adult Center for Enrichment and Project Compassion to offer a Support Team Development Training. This day long training will be September 23rd from 9am-4pm at the Women's Hospital Education Center. The training is designed to equip community members with the skills needed to organize, orient, and support volunteer caregiving Support Teams.

Family members can be overwhelmed providing long term or rehabilitation care for loved ones. Communities try to aid with this care but it can be difficult. The Support Team approach can help provide structure welcoming everyone to play a role, big or small so all can share the load.

This training is designed for anyone interested in starting a support team in their community, including congregational staff and members. Get Addicted to This...

The happiest people almost always volunteer in some fashion—at their church, with environmental groups, for social service organizations and the like. Volunteering means spending time with others, and it also takes your mind off your own problems and increases self-worth and pride in your community.

Studies have shown that altruism has an effect on the brain that is similar to that of sugar and cocaine. It creates feelings of well-being, along with an addictive *feedback loop* that encourages people to keep doing it.

Also, volunteers are healthier. They tend to weigh less than those who don't volunteer, and they're even less likely to suffer a heart attack.

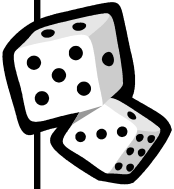
Commit to volunteering for a set period of time—say, once a week for four weeks. People are more likely to keep doing it when they make this initial commitment—and then get “hooked” on the rewards.

Shepherd's Center partners with AARP For Driver Safety

The AARP Driver Safety Program for drivers age 50 and older is a 4-hour classroom course being offered to people who want to improve their driving skills.

Participants will learn:

- About the 3-second rule in driving;
- How to compensate for changes in vision, hearing, and reaction time;
- How medications may affect driving;
- What to do if confronted by an aggressive driver;
- Tips on driving in rain, snow, ice, fog; and
- How to tell when it is time to stop driving.

There are no tests. Upon completion of the course, participants will receive a certificate to be taken to their insurance company which **may** entitle them to a reduction in their premium.
