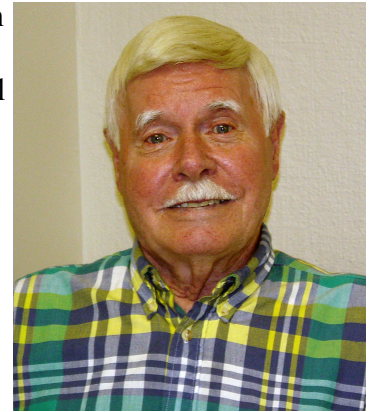

“Making A Difference”

“I consider myself being able to help people with my computer,” says Robert Keck, a quadriplegic on a ventilator as a result of a lifelong battle with polio. “I am a member of several post-polio groups and I communicate with people in Canada, Mexico, England, and all over the US. I go visit nursing homes and go to parks. I take pictures and download and share them with people all over the world. A lot of people, their physical condition won’t allow them to get out like I do. They enjoy seeing my pictures.”

Robert learned to use the computer after contacting SeniorNet Coordinator Jean Eason. Robert says, “I didn’t know they had technology that people with limited dexterity could use on the computer.” Fortunately, Jean knew the perfect volunteer, Walter Jessup, who was willing to provide in-home tutoring. A computer program called EZ Keys allows Robert to use his laptop. “I can talk computer language and he knows what to do in the menu using his thumb to maneuver,” says Walter who has taught Robert to navigate the web, send emails, balance his checkbook and even shop and bank online. Robert also has high tech software which enables him to manipulate his TV, radio, DVD & VCR equipment from his computer. “Soon it will give me the capability to cut the lights on and off,” says Robert. “It’s just really opened up the world to me.”

One day Robert called Walter and said he wanted to make a DVD for his family. “I scanned the pictures and he sent me music he ripped from a CD,” says Walter. “I videotaped the introduction by Robert and edited the show based on his direction.” Robert gave DVDs to about thirty of his family members who were amazed and delighted with the show entitled “Robert’s Family Reunion in Pictures.” “By encouraging me, Walter makes me feel I can do anything,” says Robert “though I may have to go at it from a different angle than a lot of people. Some people assume because you have a physical disability that it’s also mental. Oh what a great world this would be if we could see people for who they are first, instead of seeing the differences.”

“I have learned that the saying ‘What the mind can conceive, the body can achieve!’ is true,” says Walter. “Robert has a bright mind and has been able to achieve just about every task that he has set out to do using the computer. When a trainer sees the tremendous results that are accomplished from the student, it is a very rewarding feeling.”

“One of my goals in life is to encourage others and share a smile,” says Robert. “Life is good. Remember no matter the situation it could be worse and as long as there’s life, there’s hope!”

Greensboro's Bicentennial Celebration

It all started when SCG Trustee Enola Mixon (pictured top right) joined the Volunteer Committee for the Bicentennial Torch Relay. "I got involved because of the late Claudette Burroghs White. She was a friend of mine. She invited me to the meeting and asked me to pick out which committee I wanted to work with. I chose the Torch Run Committee. It was a lot of work but very enjoyable," said Enola. In memory of her friend, Enola proudly carried the torch past Claudette's house. She also carried the torch a second time while followed by a group of girl scouts and her grandchildren.



An active community leader, Enola was recently honored with the prestigious Sojourner Truth Award by The National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. at The Greensboro Club Annual Founders' Day Luncheon. We are fortunate and proud to have Enola as a leader with Shepherd's Center of Greensboro, serving her second three-year term on the Board of Trustees!

Enola recruited another SCG Trustee, Janet Plummer, retired media specialist, to participate in the Relay. "Enola handed me a form to fill out and said I should walk for the Shepherd's Center of Greensboro," said Janet. "I have enjoyed thirty years of residence in Greensboro. I really love the cultural events that I attend, the friendly people, and colorful history. I felt it was an honor to be a part of the 200th anniversary."

After attending one of the orientations at the Coliseum Special Events Center Janet received her torchbearer number, 330. "The first three of that number meant I would be carrying the torch on the third day of the torch relay and I would be the thirtieth one bearing it. My meeting place would be at 2509 Camden and I would carry the torch to 301 West Greenway South. I looked at the map on the wall to see the route. It would start at Guilford College at 4 p.m. and wind up at the Bicentennial Park at 7 p.m. As we departed the coliseum each of us was given a chance to hold an unlit torch and practice the procedure of how to hand it off to the next torchbearer. I was surprised at how heavy the torch was. I



wondered if I should be lifting weights to get ready," said Janet.

Friends from Janet's church choir, Jonathan Hoffman and Erica Roberts waited with her nearly an hour at her starting point. The block was barricaded and several people emerged from nearby houses in anticipation of the hand-off. The procession was led by two policemen on motorcycles followed by an old-fashioned fire engine with waving people on board. Behind them was a group of people in red shirts and shorts surrounding the male torchbearer. "As the man handed the torch to me everyone applauded him. My son Jonathan was snapping pictures (left) with his camera cell phone. I couldn't wipe the smile off my face. I carried the torch only a few steps when someone handed me a new torch, this one with a much brighter and bigger flame. I felt a need to hold it much higher because of the heat and large flame. People on the sidewalk were clapping and waving as I passed by. I was so proud to be there. It was exhilarating! When I handed the torch to the next bearer #331, everyone applauded me. I had completed my memorable walk. It was a great moment in my life, an unforgettable one!" said Janet.

"Many people worked on the torch run, making sure we had an official torch and the route was correct and manageable. Thanks goes to the city police for their participation in making the routes safe. The children's museum loaned their fire truck to lead the parade each day. It was a lot of fun listening to the individuals that participated and hearing about how much fun they had. All of the participants were cheerful and very happy, especially General and Mrs. Green. I enjoyed volunteering to assist with the opening and closing ceremonies too. That Friday night was very nice, with parachuters dropping in and the teacher of the year plus a large group of students bringing in the torch and placing it on the stand," replied Enola after all the excitement and hard work was over. "It was a once in a lifetime event!"
