DRIVING MISS DAISY AND MRS. ELEANOR AND MS. BERTHA AND...

No one was more surprised than I when checking my driving log one day to find that I have been driving for Shepherd's Wheels for nearly ten years! And what a learning experiences it has been – meeting so many different people (mostly women and mostly widows) throughout the years! And learning my way (almost- well, sometimes) around Greensboro.

To begin with, I am probably the most directionally impaired person ever to sit behind the wheel of a car. In addition, my husband and I moved to Greensboro from a northern area which was laid out in a very specific grid system – square blocks with numbered streets and named avenues that made sense. Greensboro seems to be like Topsy – “It just grew” - with winding roads that suddenly end and names that change in the middle of the street. My opening line to my passengers is often, “Take a good look at your home. You may never see it again.”

But I have learned more than just finding my way around the city. I have learned that there are many twists and turns to life, and many amazing people who never thought they would have to depend on strangers to take them to grocery stores and banks and pharmacies and all those ordinary places that we just zip in and out of; who never thought their spouse or child would die and leave them stranded; who never thought their money would run out, or their sight would be diminished, or they would have to use a walker to get around.

It is a wonderful thing to be able to help someone by doing something as simple as giving them a ride. It costs very little by way of time or money. Some of our drivers might drive only once a month, while others might drive two or three times a week. No matter how much time one chooses to give, unlike the stock market, it is an investment well worth the time and effort.
