(No yard or exterior work is done.) Typical projects include rewiring lamps and small appliances, fixing door/window locks, minor leaks, hanging pictures and curtains, light bulb replacement, and VCR/DVD instruction. ## Word Gardeners

Vacationing in San Antonio interfered with my attending the November 11 Adventures in Learning Forum. Still, I felt certain the women sharing stories would be a hit. Unlike most of you, I hear them read from their memoirs frequently. They never fail to awe and inspire me.

Where, you might ask, and why do these word gardeners gather? I first met most of them in a *Write for Life* course I instructed for AIL in 2009. Jeri Rowe, Reporter for the **News & Record**, wrote an article about the class, including excerpts from some of their memoirs.

An eager group, they signed up for the next AIL session I taught, insisting I expand it to two hours. Near the end of the course, some asked about other classes. Though I already taught one Memoir Writing Class for the Writers' Group of the Triad (WGOT), I agreed to begin a new one for them.

Since February 2010, I have facilitated our group sessions at Sternberger Artist Center. There we read and critique one another's work. Laughter fills the room as we share mishaps and successes. Sometimes, we shed a tear or two.

Writing a memoir resembles gardening. We each begin with a memory (the seed), which we plant lovingly but sometimes haphazardly. Praise by other group members, like sun, energizes our stories and helps us grow. Critiquing, similar to rain, clears away the grit, helping sentence flow. After weeding out unnecessary words, we fertilize with sensory language, and voila, we create gardens of prose to pass on to friends and family.

Each member enlivens the group with a distinct writing style. Marie Secret, penning her exciting adventures, brings to mind tiger lilies. The words of Seena Granowsky have the healing power of camomile. The succinct prose of Pat Jackson is perfect as a rose, and Peggy Christenbury's slow-paced, distinctly southern stories, share the sweet elegance of magnolias. When Renee Ledwell-Jackson, reads, I think of poppies, for her stories record memories of living during the Great Depression and a World War. Janet Shoffner's words, like a hot pepper plant, never fail to surprise. Hearing Ellen Day, a local actor, read from her memoir is as thrilling as viewing a rare orchid. Two members of the group could not be there: Nancy White, whose careful accounts of her life, are as intricately developed as a hydrangea and Carole Seitz, whose lyrical style, like azaleas, lures us with brilliance.

What's next for the word gardeners? Continue writing, continue loving to write, and, hopefully, publishing a joint anthology next year.

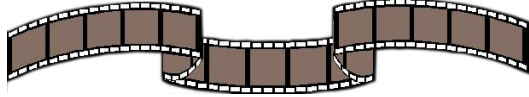

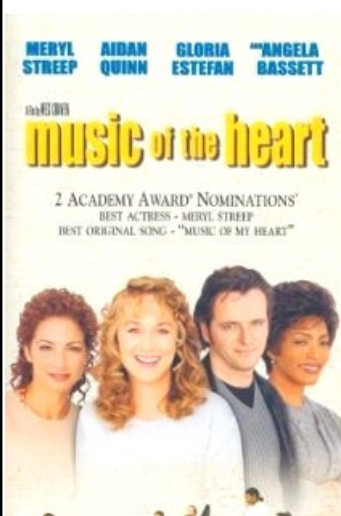

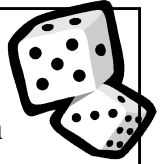

## ShepNet Computer Classes

Computer classes (using Windows operating system) for persons age 50+ are taught by Shepherd's Center peer volunteers. Classes meet twice weekly (Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday) in the morning (9:00 – 11:30) or afternoon (1:30 – 4:00).

(Students with Windows Vista should enroll in Win7 classes as well). In January we will be conducting Windows 7 workshops for our coaches. And we hope that in February 2011 we will have the teaching materials ready to offer the new Win7 classes for persons already on our waitlist. ### **MANAGING YOUR XP COMPUTER SYSTEM – 6 sessions**

*Become more proficient in using your operating system. Manage your desktop, files and folders, menus and settings. Review security issues and maintenance.*

*This course is a prerequisite for the following courses.*

### **WORD PROCESSING – 8 sessions**

*Prepare correspondence, documents, and other text materials with Word 2007. Requires mastery of above course topics and expectation to practice between class sessions.*
