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A T wo Decade A dventure in Learning

Sometime in the month of February 1996, I received a phone call in my office at

UNCG asking if I would be willing to teach a six-week course on the history of the Olympic Games. Since this would be the Centennial year of the Games and they were to be held in Atlanta, GA that summer, some historical background would be of great interest to many Adventures in Learning (AIL) participants. And so began what is now a nineteen year association with this intellectually stimulating program!

The following year I again received a call inviting me to teach another course in the area of sport history since that was my academic area of specialization. Based upon my first enjoyable experience with AIL, I agreed to put together a course on the early history of baseball.

Baseball and its role in American culture and history had long been an interest of mine and I had always included it as an integral part of my broader university courses on the cultural foundations of sport in American society. Much to my surprise, some three dozen men and women signed up for and actually attended the entire six weeks to explore the founding and first fifty years of American baseball and how it interacted with other important societal events of the period. The next year at AIL we covered the remainder of the twentieth century and along the way many participants shared their own personal experiences with the game. Over the years we have explored many aspects of the history of the "National Pastime" and even ventured into another subject examining the historical ties between sport and religion in America.



During this period I eased into retirement myself and have become an enthusiastic participant in AIL. *Why AIL?* The success and popularity of the Adventures in Learning program gives substance to the adage "*education is a life-long process.*" To see the smiling faces of participants each week as we gather to participate in the various course offerings is to witness this eager love of learning. An active mind is an open mind and an open mind leads us into new ideas and understandings that keep us stimulated and alive in the very best ways.





ADVENTURES IN LEARNING offers enrichment and fellowship opportunities for all Greensboro area men and women. There are **16** classes from which you can create your own schedule. All variations are welcome. At midday, there is a quiet period of inspiration and meditation led by volunteers. After lunch, a Forum and announcements of general interest, along with social and fellowship activities, make midday a special time.

Prepaid Lunch, at a cost of \$8.00, is served in the Fellowship Hall beginning around noon. Or, bring a sack lunch and join any table.



Computer classes (using a Windows operating system) for persons age 50+ are taught by Shepherd's Center peer volunteers. They are offered monthly in the ShepNet Computer Center for Seniors at Friends Homes Guilford, 1st floor of the Hinshaw Building, 925A New Garden Road, Greensboro.


