The Positive Side

In a recent workshop on aging with grace, the speaker explored the idea of seeing our senior years as a time of great opportunity. Even with challenges and transitions, people who are enjoying their days have common traits



of continuing to develop relationships, exploring, having positive attitudes, staying active, and enjoying a link to others in fellowship.

This idea is reinforced by an important study done at Stanford's Center on Longevity, called *The Sightlines Project*. Their three key areas in the benchmark project over 2 decades with 1.2 million Americans were health, financial security and social connections. They highlight the positive and negative trends so that "people, policies and private sector services can adapt and improve" in order to build long, healthy lives.

"Compelling scientific evidence indicates that living long and living well is most realistic for those who are socially engaged, adopt healthy living behaviors and are able to build financial security."

Social engagement has positive health and longevity benefits. Social isolation is as strong a risk factor for early mortality as cigarette smoking. They also highlight concerns that baby boomers may become more isolated than persons who are now 70-90, due to not knowing neighbors, divorce rates, technology, and less involvement in religious or community organizations.

The change and challenges of financial security are deeply impacted by the decline of retirement plans, the increase of educational debt, and the strain of living longer on fixed incomes. Their findings are most concerning for the generations that follow the boomers.

Most of us know the importance of avoiding risky behaviors (smoking, excessive drinking/drugs, etc) and making healthy choices on a daily basis. While Americans focus more on the benefits of exercise, the increasing rate of sitting is now increasing and we need to continue to focus on the importance of sleep and diet to retain health.

So stay positive, active and independent...we need you as our role models!

Most of you know that Jim was the catalyst behind SCG, but he also served on boards at Adult Center for Enrichment, CAN-NC, Boy Scouts, WellSpring Community, West Market St. United Methodist Church, Greensboro Lions Club, and Leadership Greensboro Seniors. He was busy sharing ideas, supporting teams who worked on those ideas, and offering kind words of support. One of his many favorite quotes resonates with us: "May the overflow from my cup fall warmly on those in need."

When Jim Weikel initiated the idea of a Shepherd's Center for Greensboro, he was in his early 60s and believed that there needed to be resources and programs for active, independent older adults. The importance of having programs that were interfaith and mentally stimulating were key components, as well as having it fit our local community and not duplicate services. So from these ideas sprang SCG and the thousands of older adults we have served for over 29 years.

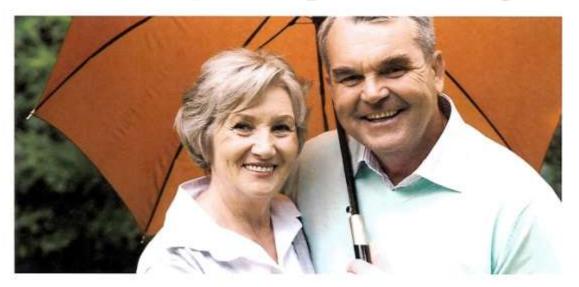

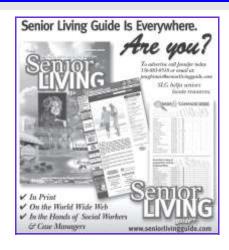
Computer Instructors & Coaches
