Step 2: <u>After</u> you pay the fee, you will get a confirmation email. Then, <u>we will email you a</u> <u>document that has the full Zoom online registration</u> so you will get your individual codes for each class you choose. Decide how the dates fit your schedule, which topics or instructors you prefer, and **then you** <u>must</u> register on Zoom for each topic you plan to attend.

Please *only select in-person classes if* you plan to attend at FBC. The seats are limited and your reservation is considered a promise-plan to attend.

*Live links to the classes cannot be shared, so **send this invitation to your friends** if you'd like them to attend.

Adding to their marital woes were the overbearing meddling of Joan's father – a rich oilman, Ash Robinson – and a torrid love affair between John and a local divorcee. This toxic marriage would lead to Joan's mysterious death in 1969 and to John's murder in 1972. This course will explore the events, the people, the relationships, and the passions surrounding this family.

<u>A Quaker Missionary in Palestine and Kenya: Lessions in History,</u> <u>Culture, and Colonialism</u>

Instructor: Max Carter

From 1929 - 1967, Annice Carter (1902-1988) served as a Quaker missionary, for 14 years in the Middle East and Africa during some of the most important historical events of the 20th century: revolts against colonialism, nation-building, military occupation, and the re-evaluation of relations between "East" and "West." In this class, we'll explore those significant events through the lens of thousands of letters Annice sent home from the mission field. Topics will include the evolving understanding of Christian mission; the lead-up to the creation of the modern state of Israel and Palestinian response; internal Quaker debates about theology and service; and a final session on the instructor's own recent work in Palestine and Israel.

Max is a retired professor of Quaker Studies at Guilford College and the great-nephew of Annice Carter. He is the author of two books that will be released in 2023, the biography of his great-aunt Annice and the sequel to "Palestine and Israel: A Personal Encounter."
