



# AUTUMN 2023 Adventures In Learning virtual & in-person classes

With new and returning instructors, we invite you to join our classes from wherever you live or vacation.

We are going back into the hybrid model for a full 6-week series of our famous Adventures In Learning semester. Our version of hybrid is having **Zoom classes on Tuesdays and Fridays**, plus offering **in-person small classes on Thursday mornings**.

Autumn session begins September 21 for the in-person morning classes at First Baptist Church. If you remember the lunchtime forum (back when we had full-day classes), you will be happy to learn that we are keeping that format to help you connect with friends in conversations over coffee and snacks between classes, and adding back speakers that will enliven our Community Forum to keep us informed about local services and leaders.

Autumn classes on Zoom, from your home or on vacation, begin on October 10 with Tom Brawner once again kicking off the Zoom sessions.

You can sign up for 1 or 3 or 10 based on your schedule and interests, all for a one-time fee. But you must register!

**Step1:** Click on the link **on page 6** of this document to get online to <u>choose your classes and then pay the semester fee of just \$55.00</u>. You will **pay online, through the secure website**, using PayPal or your credit card. Be sure to correctly enter your preferred email address as that is the only way we can send you the connection links for your Zoom classes. \*

**Step 2:** <u>After</u> you pay the fee, you will get a confirmation email. Then, <u>we will email you the links to do the full Zoom online registration</u> so you will get your individual codes for each class you choose. Decide how the dates fit your schedule, which topics or instructors you prefer, and **then you will register on Zoom for each topic** you plan to attend. (People who choose only in-person classes will not need to do step 2.)

Please *only select in-person classes if* you plan to attend at First Baptist Church. The seats are limited and your reservation is considered a promise/plan to attend.

#### **The Sonata**

The term for this musical genre, "sonata" (sonare--to sound), first appeared about 1710 and was used in contradistinction to "cantata" (cantare--to sing). These instrumental works changed over the course in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries and this set of lectures will explore its evolutionary course. Lecture content will be informed by numerous selected videos. No previous musical knowledge is required. 1-Baroque Sonatas; 2- Classical Sonatas; 3-Beethoven Sonatas; 4&5-Romantic Sonatas Gregory Carroll is a retired Professor Emeritus in the UNCG School of Music where he taught music theory, composition, and history from 1981-2020. He earned his Ph.D. from the University of Iowa with a focus in Composition/Theory.
