Happy NEW Year! We made it through another year!! We're guessing you are ready to turn that calendar page and see the possibilities for a better new year ahead. So settle into your warm home (with gratitude) and check out the many opportunities to learn something new in January & February.

We are going back into the hybrid model for a full 6-week series of our famous Adventures In Learning semester. Our version of hybrid is having **Zoom classes on Tuesdays and Fridays**, and then offering **in-person small classes on Thursday mornings**. We are keeping the **Community Forum** format between the in-person classes so there is conversation time over coffee/snacks along with speakers who will inform us of local programs and issues.

Step1: Click on the link on page 5 of this document to get online to choose your classes and then to pay the winter semester fee of \$55.00. Be sure to enter your preferred email address as that is the only way we can send you the connection links for your Zoom classes. **

Step 2: <u>After you pay the fee, you will get a confirmation email. Then, we will email you the links to do the full Zoom online registration</u> so you will get your individual codes for each class you choose. Decide how the dates fit your schedule, which topics or instructors you prefer, and **then you will register on Zoom for each topic** you plan to attend. (People who choose only in-person classes will not need to do step 2.)

Please *only select in-person classes if* you plan to attend on Thursdays at FBC. The seats are limited and your reservation is considered a promise-plan to attend.

*Live links to the classes cannot be shared, so **send this invitation to your friends** if you'd like them to attend. ** IF you cannot register/make payment online, you must call Vickie at 336.501.8849 to let her know you are mailing a check to our post office box (SCG, P.O. Box 4063, Greensboro NC 27404)

An American Value: Freedom

Max is a retired professor of Quaker Studies at Guilford College and the author of three books on Palestine and Israel. Since 1970 he has made nearly 40 service-learning and academic trips to the region.

Contemporary Poetry

This class will continue to examine the imagery and meaning of contemporary poetry. Bob will draw on the work of several contemporary poets. Members of the class may read and discuss their poems, in an atmosphere of collegiality and support. New topics, poets, and poems have been added, making this course appropriate for those who have taken the class before.

The Courtship of Single Snails and Other Animal Oddities

Instructor: Jayne Owen Parker, PhD

This class will explore diversity in the animal kingdom by prying into the quirky and unexpected ways that people differ from other species of animals. As examples, we will look at how gender is determined in different species (incubation temperatures determine if a turtle will hatch as a male or female, clownfish all hatch as males that turn into females if they live long enough! And all snails are both male and female throughout their lifetimes.) We will also examine animals' sleep patterns, learning of species that lack brains, and survival in environments that would be deadly to us.

Jayne has worked at the NC Zoo Society as an educator and communications officer for more than 25 years. She writes and teaches about wildlife and nature and finds joy in exploring and explaining quirky adaptations that prepare species to survive in specialized habitats.

ShepNet Computer & Technology: The lead volunteer instructors and our team are updating the computer labs, located at Starmount Presbyterian Church. We are planning to resume in-person classes in the winter, with no more than 6 students/class plus offering some Zoom topics. At this point we will offer computer classes based on Windows10, but we are planning to launch a new classroom for Windows11 in the early spring. With MS no longer supporting Win10 in the fall, we want to get ahead of the deadline and help you learn what's new with Windows 11 that will arrive with all new computers. We are still fundraising to purchase all new equipment that will handle the Windows11 software, AND, we need volunteers to coach in the classrooms while teachers teach, to help with tasks behind-the-scenes with mailings or data, to teach regular or new tech topics, and to keep this unique program moving along with all the changes.
